
Scale Study: Level 1


Our music notes follow the Alphabet from A - G, before repeating. On trumpet, the first note we usually learn is our "low C"



The first type of scale that we learn is our **Major Scale**, which is 8 notes long, so that it starts and ends on the same note.

The "C major scale" starts and ends on our C.

The distance between our $\underline{low C}$ and our $\underline{high C}$ is called an \underline{Octave} .




Using the notes from our major scale, we can also make another type of scale called **the Pentatonic Scale**.

This is a **6 note** scale used often when we're trying to improvise.

This uses all of same the notes except the 4th and 7th, which in the key of C is our "F" and "B"



We can also use notes from our scales together to make **Triads**, **Arpeggios**, and **Chords**. When we play the **1st-3rd-5th** notes of our major scale seperately we make our **Major Triad**. And if we play the **1st-3rd-5th-7th**, we make our **Major 7 Arpeggio**. If we play the notes together on a piano or a guitar, it creates a **Major Chord**.



This exercise helps us with our finger speed, using only notes found in our C major scale. Remember to accent the first note in each triplet, and to use more air to "push" the higher notes out.
